

## ABOUT THE CONTRIBUTORS

**Adam Tomasi** is a PhD student in World History at Northeastern University. His research focuses on the intellectual history and print culture of the twentieth century Left in the United States and United Kingdom. Adam's dissertation is a comparative study of the American and British New Left's engagement with questions of race, racism, and social justice. He is also pursuing training in public history and digital humanities at Northeastern, and his forthcoming digital project uses mapping to examine demonstrations in the United States against the Vietnam War, to analyze by region the prominence of protests' affiliation with key organizations or their degree of bottom-up spontaneity.

**Hannah Anneliese Bailey** is a PhD candidate in the American Studies department at the University of Kansas. Her dissertation "Colonized by Freedom: Making the State, Private Property, and Race in Kansas" analyzes the settlement of Kansas as an imperial project, looking at how changing relationships to property ownership during and after the nineteenth century created categories of personhood in the settler colonial state. Her other research includes the article "Unlikely Captivities: The Narrative of Development in Jenna Miscavige Hill's Ex-Scientology Escape Narrative" which was published in *Soundings: An Interdisciplinary Journal* (2018).

**Donald Yacovone**, an Associate at Harvard University's Hutchins Center, received the W.E.B. Du Bois Medal, the university's highest honor in the field of African and African American studies. Yacovone has taught at several American colleges, served as an editor at the *Black Abolitionist Papers Project*, and became the senior associate editor at the Massachusetts Historical Society where he founded and edited the *Massachusetts Historical Review*. In 2013, he and Henry Louis Gates, Jr., wrote *The African Americans: Many Rivers to Cross*, and in 2016 he published his eighth book, *Wendell Phillips, Social Justice, and the Power of the Past*, a co-edited essay collection. His next book is *Teaching White Supremacy: The Textbook Battle Over Race in American History*.

**Mack Penner** is a PhD candidate, SSHRC Doctoral Fellow, and Harry Lyman Hooker Senior Doctoral Fellow in the Department of History at McMaster University. He is working on the intellectual history of neoliberalism and, less frequently, on the history of the Canadian left.

**Ravi Malhotra** is a Full Professor at the Faculty of Law, Common Law Section at the University of Ottawa. He is a graduate of Harvard Law School and the author of several books including the Routledge monograph *Exploring Disability Identity and Disability Rights through Narratives: Finding a Voice of Their Own* (with Morgan Rowe). He is currently completing, with Benjamin Isitt, a biography of double amputee

and Socialist Party of Canada leader E.T. Kingsley, *Able to Lead: Disablement, Radicalism and the Political Life of E.T. Kingsley*.
