Jason Garner is currently working on a post doctorate research project studying anarchist revisionism in the 1920s and 1930s in Spain and Argentina in its international and transnational context at the Instituto de Investigaciones en Diversidad cultural y Procesos de Cambio (IIDyPCA), Universidad Nacional de Río Negro, Patagonia, Argentina. He is the author of *Goals and Means: Anarchism, Syndicalism, and Internationalism in the Origins of the Federación Anarquista Ibérica* (published by AK Press) and numerous articles on the Spanish anarchist and revolutionary syndicalist movement as well as on consumer cooperation in Catalonia.

José Benclowicz is an Associate Professor at the Universidad Nacional de Río Negro where he also works as an associate researcher at the Instituto de Investigaciones en Diversidad Cultural y Procesos de Cambio (IIDyPCA), a branch of the National Scientific and Technical Research Council (CONICET) of Argentina. His research interests include Shi'ite political thought, radical Islamic movements, revolutionary thought in the Middle East, the Arab-Israeli conflict, and Marxism and neo-Marxism in the Middle East. Dr. Kanaaneh is the author of *Understanding Hezbollah: The Hegemony of Resistance* (Syracuse University Press, 2021).

Mariana Stoler is a social historian who specializes in the study of labour and unions in the second half of the twentieth century. She holds a Ph.D. in Contemporary History at Universidad Autónoma de Madrid. Her research focuses on Argentinian unions, factories, and workers' identities in an attempt to understand the processes by which subjectivities are built.
