## ABOUT THE CONTRIBUTORS

Elun Gabriel is Professor of History at St. Lawrence University in Canton, New York. He is the author of the book Assassins & Conspirators: Anarchism, Socialism, and Political Culture in Imperial Germany (Northern Illinois University Press, 2014). He has published articles on anarchism, political violence, and utopian thought in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. Future projects include articles on the Imperial League Against Social Democracy active in pre-World War I Germany; politics, empire, and modernism in the works of J.R.R. Tolkien; and an analysis of the authorship of a famous anonymous work on seventeenth century Atlantic pirates. He teaches courses on modern Europe, World War I, Weimar and Nazi Germany, the Holocaust, and genocide in the modern world.

His dissertation looks at the impact of Social Gospel radicalism on socialist party success in Canada and the United States. Gabriel was twice named a graduate fellow in Boston University's Institute on Culture, Religion & World Affairs (CURA). Additionally, he is a fellow with *Communities Engaging with Difference and Religion* (CEDAR), where he has participated in summer schools in Kyrgyzstan and Indonesia.
